<u>Required Texts</u>

There are currently no required texts for this course, activities, handouts, in-class readings, and other course content will be provided through the online component of the course. Students will then have the option of printing the materials or sharing them to e-readers and smart devices. Some content will also be made available for in-class download to smart devices using QR Code. (If you are not sure what any of that means, don't worry about it; I will be showing you!)

Course Description

• Prerequisite: demonstration of required level of English proficiency or minimum grade of C in EAP 1520

Students develop ability to comprehend and interpret authentic college-level texts in content areas by applying appropriate reading strategies. Lab work of two hours per week is a required component of this course. In order to pass this course, students must earn a grade of C or better in course work and lab work and a passing score on the Comprehensive State Exit Final Exam.

Course Competencies:

1) Improving English vocabulary, 2) locating key concepts, 3) reading critically, 4) reading for study and enjoyment, and 5) reading multi-media/hypertext material effectively. EAP 1620 will also reinforce the following competencies wholly or partially: CLAST Communication Skills: essay, reading, English language, and logical reasoning skills; and Valencia Student Core Competencies: Think, Value, Act, & Communicate

Think: Think clearly, critically, and creatively by being able to analyze, synthesize, integrate, and evaluate in many domains of human inquiry

Value: Make reasoned judgments and responsible commitments with empathy and fairmindedness.

Act: In personal, professional, and community settings, act purposefully, effectively, and responsibly with courage and perseverance.

Communicate: Effectively communicate verbally, non-verbally, and visually with honesty and civility in different disciplines and settings with different audiences using varied means.

Assessment of Major Learning Outcomes

During the course of the semester students will be assessed, both formatively and summatively, on their ability to apply thinking and problem solving/critical thinking strategies to college level reading materials and demonstrate comprehension of college reading materials.

Classroom Policies

Attendance/Participation

Attendance is required, but preparedness and participation are equally important. All students are expected to be in class on time with all required materials and ready to participate. **Simple presence in the classroom DOES NOT constitute attendance.** Presence in combination with preparedness and participation does. Two incidences of a lack of preparation/participation or of tardiness of more than 5 minutes will be considered the same as an absence. Students who show up after attendance has been taken are responsible for notifying the instructor of their presence in the classroom. Failure to do so will result in an absence. Students will be permitted 2 absences provided they have given advance notice and have proper documentation. Absences without advance notice and/or documentation will be considered unexcused absences. Students with 2 unexcused absences cannot earn a grade higher than B in the course. Students with 4 unexcused absences may be withdrawn at the discretion of the instructor.

Thoughtful completion of online activities will count as attendance for hybrid/on-line class meetings. Failure to complete online work by the appropriate due dates will be considered the same as absence in face to face courses and the same consequences will apply.

Late Papers

All assignments are due during the first five minutes of class on the assigned day. **No late work will be accepted.** However, make up work can be given if students request it, but only at the discretion of the instructor.

Withdrawal from the Class

Per Valencia Policy 4-07 (Academic Progress, Course Attendance and Grades, and Withdrawals), a student who withdraws from class before the withdrawal deadline of (Mar 25th) will receive a grade of "W." A student is not permitted to withdraw after the withdrawal deadline. A faculty member MAY withdraw a student up to the beginning of the final exam period for violation of the class attendance policy. A student who is withdrawn by faculty for violation of the class attendance policy will receive a grade of "W." Any student who withdraws or is withdrawn from a class during a third or subsequent attempt in the same course will be assigned a grade of "F."
